- Access to essential goods and services

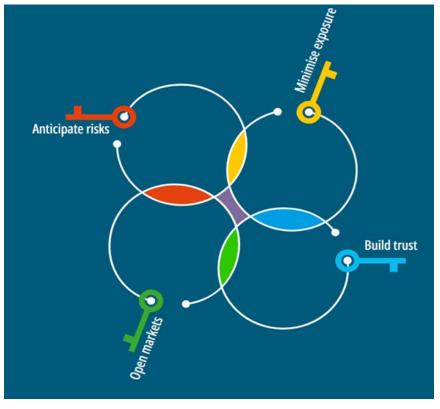
But there also risks (re-priced and new)

 - Towards demystifying "trade dependencies": at what point to trade linkages become a concern?

- Promoting resilience and preparedness in supply chains

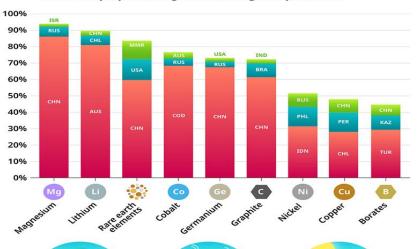

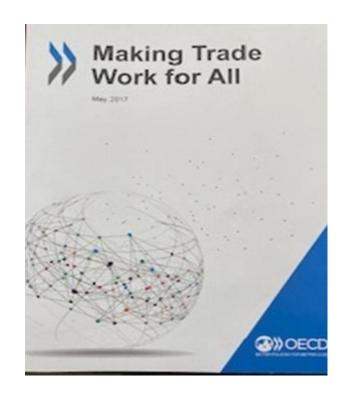

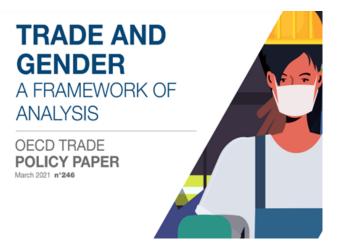

But some forms of government support

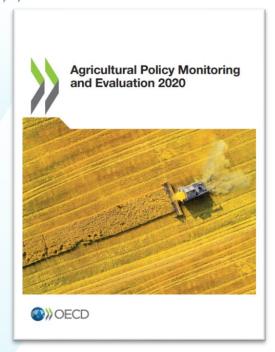
- Distort the global level playing field, undermine benefits trade and competition

- Undermine public support for globally integrated markets

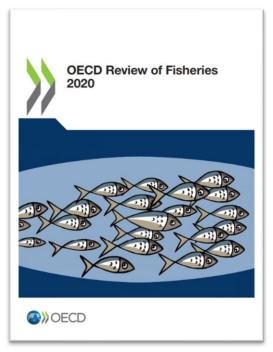
Subsidies are both a global and a domestic story

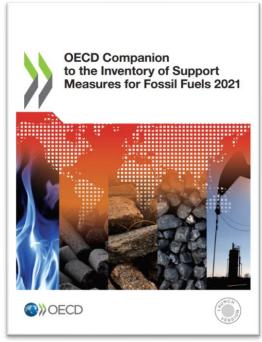
- What others do affects your choices

- Opportunity costs for scarce public resources

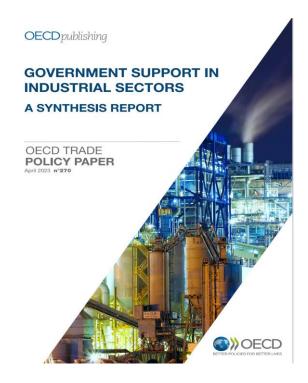

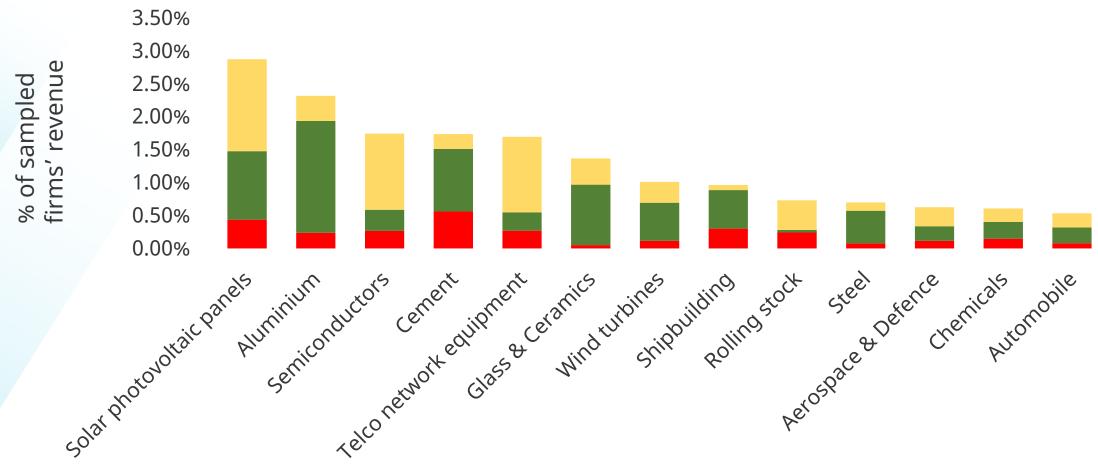




The OECD brings transparency to government support across sectors

Overview

Improved transparency is a fundamental first step for governments to cooperate more on subsidies. A better understanding of the complexity, size, design, and effects of subsidy measures could facilitate and expedite discussions to strengthen multilateral rules.

Our understanding of subsidies remains uneven and incomplete; while information for some sectors is relatively developed, in others it remains at an earlier stage. Filling important gaps in knowledge on the landscape of subsidies requires building greater transparency by governments at the national level and through international fora. International organizations that invest in collecting information on subsidies can also do more, individually and collectively, to identify and measure subsidies.

This platform is a first step to enhance transparency by bringing together in a common space information on subsidies from the International Monetary Fund (IMF), Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), World Bank Group (WBG), and World Trade Organization (WTO). The site will continue to be improved and suggestions are welcome.
