Better strategies for stronger communities

Beyond the shockwaves of COVID-19 and the humanitarian, social and economic pressures sparked by Russia's large scale aggression against Ukraine, broader shifts such as the green transition, digitalisation and demographic change are fundamentally changing the communities where people live, work, create and consume. These changes bring both opportunities and challenges such as the changing geography of jobs and a need to massively rethink and ramp up our skills systems to keep pace with these changes. While these shifts may seem unprecedented, this is not the first time that communities have undergone transformational changes. What can be learned from how communities have managed such transformations in the past, and what innovative approaches are communities taking to help all places and people emerge stronger and more resilient, together.

On the occasion of the 40th Anniversary of the OECD's Local Employment and Economic Development Programme, the 2022 Edition of the Local Development Forum will bring together hundreds of participants to reflect on how to

- Improve the **quality of local jobs**, and ensure that more people have the **right skills** to fill them, particularly in light of the digital and green transitions
- Go beyond the usual suspects, and leverage a wider range of community assets for local development, such as the social economy and culture
- Expand economic opportunities and inclusion to create places where all residents thrive

For many, other barriers, from childcare to transport to mental and physical health challenges inhibit meaningful engagement in education and training systems and employment. While digital delivery has helped to expand access, it also limits the types of face-to-face supports that may be the most beneficial for some. This workshop will explore how to improve on-ramps and pathways for people who want to re-engage in education and training, and employment, but may face barriers in doing so. Expanding entrepreneurship opportunities for all VENUE: Skills gaps remain an important barrier to sustainable inclusive and social entrepreneurship UCC CENTRE FOR EXECUTIVE EDUCATION activities. For example, only 39% of women in the European Union self-reported having the skills and knowledge needed to start a business between 2016 and 2020 relative to 50% of men. Furthermore, there are important skills gaps for social entrepreneurship, which requires specific skill sets and access to knowledge and resources to maintain the social purpose and implement their specific business models.
