### **CASE STUDY 01**

### MUSEUM DE FUNDATIE

Museum de Fundatie is perhaps the most iconic museum in the north of the Netherlands. Recently, the museum wanted to bring its own broad permanent collection back into the center of attention and we helped with that by putting three centerpieces on socks. The three artworks by Paul Citroen, Franz Marc and Picabia make for a diverse but complete collection with something for every visitor.

- Number of visitors: ±280,000 per year
- *Type of a*rt: A wide range of styles from 1400-present with the main criterion being 'visual pleasure'
- Designs: Portrait of Heinz Aaron, The Creation of Horses, Papillons (all permanent collection)











- Franz Marc's work is full of symbolism, for example, it was very important to make the red (symbol of the earthly) and the blue (symbol of the spirit) really stand out
- The sun and moon represent the cycle of nature. We placed these symbols so that they are close to each other yet visible on different sides of the ankle.
- Because both sides are so unique, we chose not to mirror the design so that both are visible on the outside of an ankle.

- The painting is from a series of so-called "transparencies" where Picabia superimposes several paintings on top of each other. By only partially using the colours of the top layers, the same effect is created on the sock.
- Since the design is very crowded, some
  of the details have been moved to the
  inside of the ankle. This keeps the sock
  stretchable and also makes the inside
  interesting to look at.
- A gradient from the elastic to the rest of the design completes the look









- The work's dynamic background color is represented by placing a gradient around the head
- The suit blends seamlessly with the black base color of the foot
- The portrait is placed twice (mirrored) on the sock so that it is always clearly visible


# CASE STUDY 02 MUSEUM PRINSENHOF DELFT


For this commission, a total of no less than six different types of sock designs were made for Museum Prinsenhof Delft. Besides very diverse exhibitions, the museum also has a broad permanent collection that includes paintings by Dutch masters through the ages, a lot of tableware in the Delft Blue style and sights from the rich Dutch history, especially around William of Orange. The focus for this commission was on the two main pillars of the permanent collection: Delft Blue and Prince William, and in addition two designs were made for an temporary exhibition by Jan van Schoonhoven.

- Number of visitors: ±80,000 per year
- Type of art: Baroque, Delft Blue, History objects, Modern Exhibitions
- Designs: 2x Delft Blue (permanent collection), 2x 19th century Baroque (permanent collection), 2x Different methods of minimalism (temporary exhibition)

- Light blue instead of white base color for more color and less chance of greying quickly
- Showing the centerpiece of the work in a similar but less abundant way on the center of the sock
- Very elaborate detail, leaving the rest blank for extra stretch and comfort



- Light blue instead of white base color for more color and less chance of greying quickly
- One nice detail chosen to make a complete pattern out of it, which is vey typical for Delft Blue merchandise
- Left enough room in between the pattern for base color for stretchability and comfort




Style: Minimalism (monochrome relief)








- Chosen shades of grey to be closer to the colours in the exhibition space (Option 2)
- Left the pattern open at the back for extra comfort (vertical lines in particular quickly make a sock less stretchy)
- With only four colours for light and shade, the sock design appears three-dimensional

Style: Minimalism (glassware)







- Deliberately chose an asymmetrical pattern so that it appears hand-drawn (Option 1)
- Because only two colours were needed for knitting, it was possible to make a small and abundant pattern
- Grey detail on black base was a lot more stretchy than black lines on grey base









- Matching to the dark baroque style by choosing a predominant black design
- Displaying the high detail in a stylised manner where only the most important details are visible to maintain recognisability
- Reuse the detail from Willem's sleeve as an additional accent on the top side of the sock



- Designed an in-house developed interpretation of the little dog that is recognisable but playful and cartoon-like
- Added more elastane so that the sock has good stretch and is wearable for many ages
- A green/blue base color to make the sock fun for boys and girls

**Step 3:** After approval, the official designs are produced and delivered (1-2 weeks)


**Step 4:** After approval of the official designs, we'll have samples developed (2 weeks)




