BACKGROUND

The OECD Latin America and the Caribbean Regional Programme's Second Ministerial Summit on strengthening institutions and governance will be held virtually on 8,9,10 December 2021. The last Ministerial Summit, held in Peru in 2018, tool place a few months after the 8th Summit of the Americas, during which countries in the Americas adopted an ambitious "Lima Commitment". At the OECD Ministerial, participant countries recognized the need to go "from commitments to action" through a comprehensive integrity and anti-corruption strategy. The Action Plan proposed at the time has helped some countries in the region advance such an agenda and still provides a relevant tool in the current context, where governance challenges have been further compounded by a sanitary, economic and social crisis.

Enhancing trust has been even more critical during the COVID-19 pandemic, in a context of high uncertainty where government action has been key to cushioning the impact of the crisis on lives and livelihoods. Likewise, public trust will be essential to advance a reform agenda for recovery, as this will require solid, widespread consensus across all actors of society, as highlighted by the Latin American Economic Outlook 2021. The COVID-19 crisis has underscored the importance of having comprehensive integrity frameworks in place to tackle corruption risks, which were exacerbated in the context of emergency responses. In many instances, governments in the region have approved public procurement and economic support packages through simplified and accelerated procedures, which can create challenges in relation to the necessary transparency and integrity safeguards. In this context, it is important that LAC countries adopt solid mechanisms that enable greater integrity, transparency and accountability in the use of large-scale financial and material resources to both face the crisis and assist during the recovery phase. It is also important that corruption instances are effectively addressed, including by strengthening the capacity of LAC authorities to detect and investigate such instances.

Citizens' trust in public institutions and the State has eroded over recent years – largely due to the mismanagement of financial resources, lack of fairness, openness and numerous corruption scandals – to the detriment of achievements in the fight against poverty, inequality and other areas. Trust is also one of the most important foundations upon which legitimacy and sustainability of a democratic system are built. Overcoming the impact of the COVID-19 crisis will require bold and ambitious reform agendas, which enable a strong, inclusive, resilient and green recovery. As vaccine rates rise and enable a return to higher levels of economic activity, comprehensive policies to strengthen integrity and openness will be preconditions to rebuilding trust in institutions, founding a renewed social pact, and delivering on ambitious economic and social protection reforms. Institutions that are responsive to the needs of everyone, reliable in anticipating change, that act with integrity, serve the public fairly, and listen to citizens, are also essential for regaining trust¹. Similarly, to the COVID pandemic, corruption knows no borders. Countering corruption, enhancing transparency, and rebuilding public trust across the LAC region and beyond can only be achieved through strengthened international co-operation.

Due to the sanitary situation, this OECD LACRP Ministerial Summit will be hosted virtually by El Salvador. As was the case in 2018, it aims to reinforce and support countries across the region in delivering on different political commitments to improved integrity, notably the Special Session of the General Assembly of the United Nations on Anti-Corruption and the upcoming 9th Summit of the Americas. In preparation for the Second Ministerial, the OECD together with the host country and other partners, organised three innovative webinars to address key topics including:

- Leveraging information technologies to enhance transparency, integrity and public trust
- Enhancing good governance in public procurement and large infrastructure projects, and strengthening muchneeded health systems;
- Rebuilding trust in stakeholders such as the private sector, civil society and international partners all important partners in ensuring that integrity is the foundation on which recovery and trust are built.

In addition, many of the Regional Policy Networks involved in related work held meetings over past months to advance different policy aspects that will contribute to a strengthened and comprehensive governance agenda. The Ministerial Summit to be held on 8,9,10 December 2021 will brings all of these elements together and seeks to provide countries with the policies and tools they need to make tangible progress in rebuilding trust and driving an sustainable and inclusive recovery.

Effective strategies for fostering integrity and promoting citizen trust in the aftermath of COVID-19

Fostering integrity and promoting citizen trust requires a tailor-made approach drawing upon digital government tools and public data, as well as on cooperation with the private sector, civil society and international partners. As LAC countries recover from the COVID-19 crisis, the good governance of large infrastructure projects will be key to underpin citizens' trust in their governments. Ministerial Session 1: Thursday, 9 December

Government integrity: Bringing the pieces together and closing gaps Governance, integrity and trust cannot be isolated from other policy areas. Thus, as governments seek to respond to the COVID pandemic, they must not pause their efforts to guarantee that integrity plays an integral role in all of their policy responses. The 2018 OECD-LAC Action Plan offered pathways for the design of a comprehensive integrity and anti-corruption agenda that complements LAC countries' existing efforts. Some of these pathways have become particularly relevant during the COVID crisis. For this reason, during 2021 the LACRP preparatory webinars examined key topics that merit close attention as governments seek to regain citizen trust in the complex context of dealing with the pandemic: the opportunity of using digital government tools and data, infrastructure and public procurement, and the involvement of private sector, civil society and international cooperation. This session will gather the main inputs and take-always from the three preparatory webinars as well as other meetings linked to the integrity-trust nexus of this Ministerial. It will discuss key current priorities, highlight remaining gaps, and seek deliver policy recommendations moving forward.
