This session will showcase how Local Economic Development Agencies (LEDAs) can be a catalyst for economic growth in Latin American and Caribbean (LAC) cities, leveraging investment, optimizing urban assets, and revitalizing underutilized spaces. General context: This is a Side Event of the OECD Local Development Forum. The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD) is an international organisation dedicated to improving lives through better policies. With over 60 years of experience, the OECD supports policy reform and fosters equality, prosperity, and well-being. Working with more than 100 countries, it provides evidence-based standards, trusted statistics, and a platform for collaborative policy development. Housed within the OECD Local Employment and Economic Development (LEED) Programme, within the Centre for Entrepreneurship, SMEs, Regions and Cities, the OECD Local Development Forum is a community of thousands of individuals worldwide. Its flagship event is its meeting, convening approx. 400-500 participants from a range of sectors (see chart) and 40+ countries. The 2025 Forum will take place on the 9-10 July in Barranquilla, Colombia, with side events on 8-11 July. Background Information: This session will explore how Local Economic Development Agencies (LEDAs) can serve as a strategic tool for economic development in Latin America and the Caribbean (LAC). LAC cities are experiencing rapid spatial expansion, leading to urban sprawl, infrastructure deficits, and deteriorating central areas. This dual reality presents both challenges and opportunities—while peripheral expansion requires better planning and investment, urban centers offer key spaces for regeneration and economic revitalization. LEDAs provide a long-term framework for coordinating investments, strengthening local business ecosystems, and integrating economic planning with territorial development. By fostering public-private partnerships and leveraging financial tools, LEDAs can facilitate urban transformation, enhance economic resilience, and attract both local and foreign investment. To illustrate these concepts, the session will provide an overview of policy frameworks and financial strategies that can enhance the effectiveness of LEDAs beyond

electoral cycles. It will feature experiences from a Latin American City and American City, highlighting the importance of maximizing the economic and social value of public assets to promote coordinated and sustainable urban and economic development.

Case Summaries:

New York (RPA – Marcel Negret): The Regional Plan Association (RPA) is a non-profit civic organization that has shaped planning and development in the New York–New Jersey–Connecticut region for over 100 years. RPA's work aligns closely with the goals of Local Economic Development Agencies (LEDAs), offering a metropolitan-scale model of how to coordinate land use, housing, infrastructure, and investment across jurisdictions to drive inclusive growth. Marcel Negret will present four core themes: (1) RPA's unique role in convening public, private, and civic actors across a fragmented tri-state region of 20+ million people; (2) the use of urban planning and technical research to support regeneration and economic development, particularly around land use reform; (3) the governance structure that enables RPA to influence decision-making without direct implementation power; and (4) emblematic projects such as Hudson Yards, Gateway, and the *City of Yes*, which demonstrate how cross-sector collaboration and data-driven planning can unlock long-term regional economic transformation.

Barranquilla (Ana María Aljure – Puerta de Oro): Barranquilla has led a landmark urban regeneration initiative through the revitalization of its Magdalena River waterfront, transforming underutilized land into a dynamic hub for cultural, commercial, and social activity. Ana María Aljure will present how the Mayor's Office has coordinated public and private actors under a model similar to a Local Economic Development Agency (LEDA), aligning infrastructure investment, land use planning, and economic development objectives. The case highlights how local governments in Latin America can spearhead inclusive growth by reclaiming strategic urban areas and activating them through public-private collaboration. Through strong municipal leadership, long-term planning, and cross-sector coordination, Barranquilla demonstrates a replicable approach to leveraging urban assets for sustainable local economic development.

Juan Pablo Bonilla, Manager, Climate Change and Sustainable Development Sector, Inter-American Development Bank (IDB)

Juan Pablo Bonilla is the Manager of the IDB's Climate Change and Sustainable Development Sector (CSD). Previously, he was Chief of Staff to the Executive Vice President of the Inter-American Development Bank.

Dr. Bonilla has worked on environmental sustainability, climate change and energy for more than 20 years. He led the IDB's Sustainable Energy and Climate Change Initiative, a major strategic step for integrating climate change and sustainability as a priority for the Bank. Before joining the IDB, Dr. Bonilla worked as Senior Specialist at the World Bank, and was a member of the United Nation's CDM Executive Board.

In Colombia, after serving as the Executive Director of a new think tank Fundesarrollo, and as National Environmental Manager of ANDI, Dr. Bonilla launched new initiatives such as the National Climate Change Policy and the National Biotechnology Policy as principal advisor to the country's Vice President. Dr. Bonilla served as Deputy Minister of Environment, and acting Minister of Environment, Housing and Territorial Development.

Dr. Bonilla obtained a B.A. in Civil Engineering from the Universidad Javeriana in Bogotá, Colombia, and then received a M.Sc. in Engineering Management and Systems Engineering and a Ph.D. in Environmental and Energy Management from George Washington University.



Maria Camila Uribe, Principal Technical Lead of the Housing and Urban Development Division and Coordinator of the IDB Cities Network, Inter-American Development Bank (IDB)

Maria Camila Uribe is Principal Technical Lead of the Housing and Urban Development Division, and the Coordinator of the IDB Cities Network of the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB). She holds both a bachelor's and studies in master's degree in Economics from Los Andes University in Colombia, a master's degree in Public Administration from the Kennedy School at Harvard University and a master's degree in Cities at the London School of Economics.
